

**NIH Clinical Psychology Practicum**  
**Alcohol Use Disorder in Adults Track**  
**National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA)**

**Overview:**

As part of the NIH Clinical Psychology Practicum Program, the Alcohol Use Disorder in Adults Track is housed within the Office of the Clinical Director of NIAAA. The training site is located at the NIH Clinical Center where the clinical psychology practicum student (also known as “clinical psychology extern”) will engage in a variety of clinical-related activities under the supervision of a credentialed licensed clinical psychologist. The Alcohol Use Disorder in Adults Track is suited for doctoral clinical psychology graduate students currently enrolled in an APA-accredited Ph.D. program in the Washington D.C. area, and especially those who are interested in addiction treatment.

**General Information:**

Duration: 10-12 months; Time commitment: 16 hours per week

Required meetings: Weekly multidisciplinary rounds on Mondays and weekly supervision

**Description of Externship:**

The NIAAA Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD) in Adults Track is designed to provide clinical training experience in the evaluation of AUD and the provision of evidence-based brief interventions for patients with AUD and related conditions. Intervention approaches include individual cognitive behavioral therapy and group skills training informed by dialectical behavior therapy (DBT; see Luk & Thompson, 2024). Practicum students will work within a multidisciplinary team and develop case conceptualization and intervention skills that could facilitate patients’ sobriety goals and promote their quality of life.

Applicants who have prior experience with cognitive behavioral therapy and/or any third wave behavior therapy (e.g., ACT or DBT) will be chosen preferentially.
